

About the Collection

The Texas Borderlands Collection spans 1887 to 1923, with some issues moving into the 1940s. These issues give voice to the ancestors of the current inhabitants of Texas, who come from multiple cultures.

Early settlers of what was then a frontier experimented with evolving agricultural practices to survive and are productive, and the titles from the late 19th and early 20th centuries discuss these different practices and how settlers used them to negotiate life in an unfamiliar landscape. The titles represented counties on or near the Texas-Mexico border and supported their respective populations through simple news service. Political ideologies were unique to every county, and these newspapers shed light on how the county inhabitants dealt with civil disputes, elections, debates, and world events.



Feeding the machine

- Texas has no single repository for our newspapers (unlike other states).
- Identifying, locating, negotiating access and permissions takes a large amount of time.
- Working with funders like the Tocker Foundation, Texas State Library and Archives Commission (TSLAC), local libraries, and community groups.



Content is King

- From the beginning with NDNP we started by digitizing microfilm, first with vendors then in-house.
- We added scanning from paper in 2010 because we were finding so many titles that hadn't been filmed.
- In 2011 we started to collect born-digital PDF print masters.
- The Special Collections Department at the UNT Libraries acquires titles that no longer have a local repository



Sustaining the Program

Securing TDNP for the future

- Cathy N. Hartman Portal to Texas Endowment.
 - Began in 2012 to broadly support the content acquisition, educational programs, **technology**, and **preservation** activities of The Portal to Texas History
 - 2014 we were awarded an NEH Challenge Grant to help build the endowment to \$2,000,000
- Endowment has already supported
 - Technology upgrades
 - 15 summer research fellowships
 - Artists Lecture Series
 - Texas Edge History Lecture Series
 - Captioning of AV material
 - Travel for meeting with partners about projects
 - Sponsorships of conferences and outreach booths.

- Access to all content is free for all users (no revenue there)
- TDNP Staff is mostly project funded (granted long-term projects)
- Program manager/unit head is only position in the unit funded by the library
- All student positions (10-15 yearly) are project funded

District sets GMPs for WS, Nichols

Jackvillensis ISD is one step closer to a new building program and improvements at a second school.

During Monday's school board meeting, trustees approved the guaranteed maximum price (GMP) for construction of the new West Side Elementary, improvements at Nichols Intermediate School and a north and south parking lot at the ISD Gymnasium formerly the Lee Morris College South Events Center. The guaranteed maximum price (GMP) will be held at \$6 million, June 24 at the school's site at 818 SW Loop 496. The groundbreaking at the site of the upcoming West Side Elementary, located at 1105 College Avenue on 50 acres at the former LMC, near the gymnasium, will be held at 6 p.m. July 4.

"These are exciting times," said JSD Superintendent Dr. Joe Wardell. "I met with staff at West Side Middle on Friday and there are a lot of excited folks at those places."

The first West Side is \$4,670,000, which includes building a north parking lot at the JSD Gymnasium. The GMP at Nichols is \$4,480,772 and the GMP of the north parking lot at the gymnasium, including concrete, electrical and work, is \$489,521. The total cost is \$30,323,699, less than the \$22.78 million reported in the November 2013 bond election.

The gymnasium parking lots are expected to hold 410 cars — 202 at the south lot and 207 at the north lot. Brian Ross of Lee Lewis Construction said the company hopes to use as many local businesses during construction as possible.
